Health Effects

There is no safe level of exposure to secondhand smoke or aerosol. Even those who do not smoke are at a higher risk of health problems, including but not limited to:

- Increased inflammation
- Respiratory effects
- Coronary heart disease
- Stroke
- Lung Cancer
- Premature death

Secondhand Smoke in Women

Women may experience additional risks when pregnant — such as reproductive health issues, including low birth weight and other complications.

DID YOU KNOW...

Secondhand smoke causes more than 7,300 lung cancer deaths to non-smokers each year in the United States. There is no risk-free level of exposure to secondhand smoke.

What is **Secondhand** Smoke?



Secondhand smoke is made up of the smoke or aerosol that is emitted from lit or active tobacco products (including cigarettes, cigars, pipes and vape devices). Additionally, the air exhaled during tobacco or nicotine use is also considered secondhand smoke.



Pets aren't safe from the harm of secondhand smoke either! Your pets spend most of their time at home. They can't speak up to protect themselves, so keep them in mind and their space smoke-free. Treat your best friend to their favorite bone or treat — not avoidable health issues.





Tiny Lungs. Big Risk.

Kids have no control over their environment and what people choose to do around them. The health of your children is your responsibility. Clear the air around them to protect them from risks caused by secondhand smoke, including:

- Acute respiratory infections
- Sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS)
- Frequent ear infections
- Respiratory infections
- Potentially deadly asthma attacks

TIP: If you haven't quit yet, make an effort to smoke or vape outside and far away from any children.



DOGS

Dogs may experience more eye infections, be prone to more allergies, end up with more respiratory issues and have a higher chance of developing a variety of cancers.

CATS

Your feline friends are at a higher risk of developing asthma, lung cancer and more.

OTHER PETS

Other pets — including birds, hedgehogs and other small animals — are especially vulnerable to respiratory issues.

The Truth About Thirdhand Effects

When cats and dogs groom themselves with their tongues, they are ingesting the chemicals and toxins left behind on their fur due to secondhand and thirdhand smoke.

What is thirdhand smoke?
